Gillard Must Come Clean on Her Greens Alliance Plan to Lift Company Tax Rate to 33%

Driscoll- "A Gillard-Greens Coalition will be an economic disaster"

Scott Driscoll, National President of the **United Retail Federation**, has called on Julia Gillard to immediately confirm or deny whether she supports the Greens plan to raise the company tax rate to 33%.

"Following the cynical Gillard-Brown preference deal Ms Gillard must come clean on whether an elected Gillard-Greens Coalition will raise the company tax rate to 33% as part of the ongoing Gillard con-job on huge tax grabs," said Mr Driscoll.

"Bob Brown and his extreme Greens have confirmed in their taxation measures that they will return the company tax rate to 33% in a Gillard-Greens Coalition and in addition to their economy wrecking plans for an ETS and a 50% Super Tax.

"Australians will have absolutely nothing to show for these environmental tax grabs and they will return absolutely nothing in terms of economic or social benefits just the wipe-out of business and jobs across the country and increased cost of living.

"Ms Gillard must now confirm which of the Greens' measures she will adopt in a Gillard-Greens Coalition and which of the insane measures she will drop.

"Australia's economic and social fabric is currently at risk with a Gillard-Greens Coalition," said Mr Driscoll.
